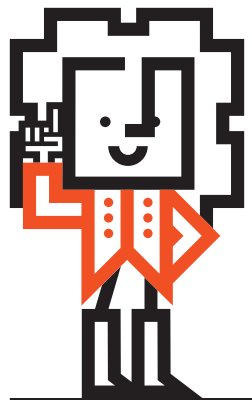


Fortress fun

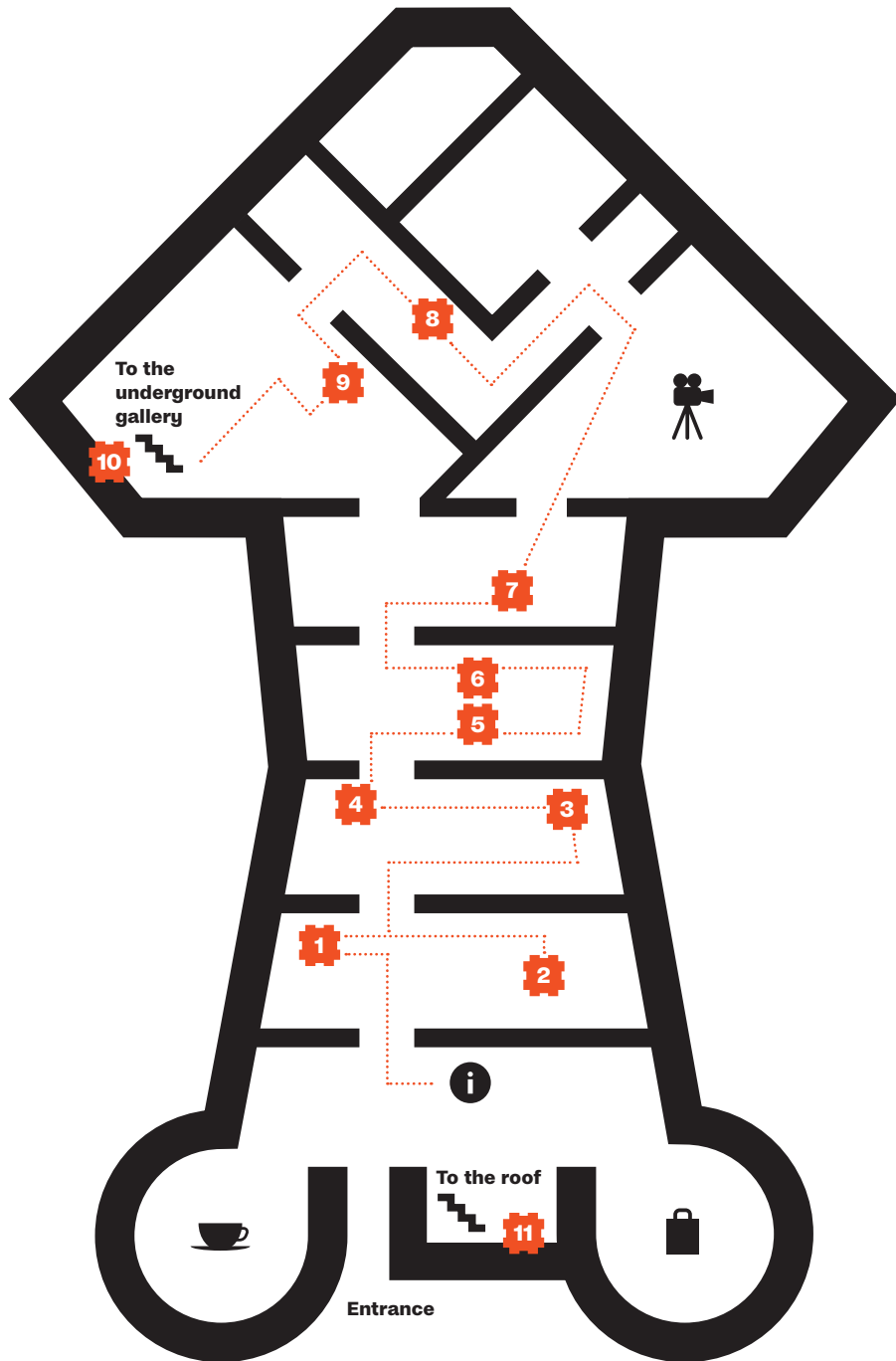




Follow me!

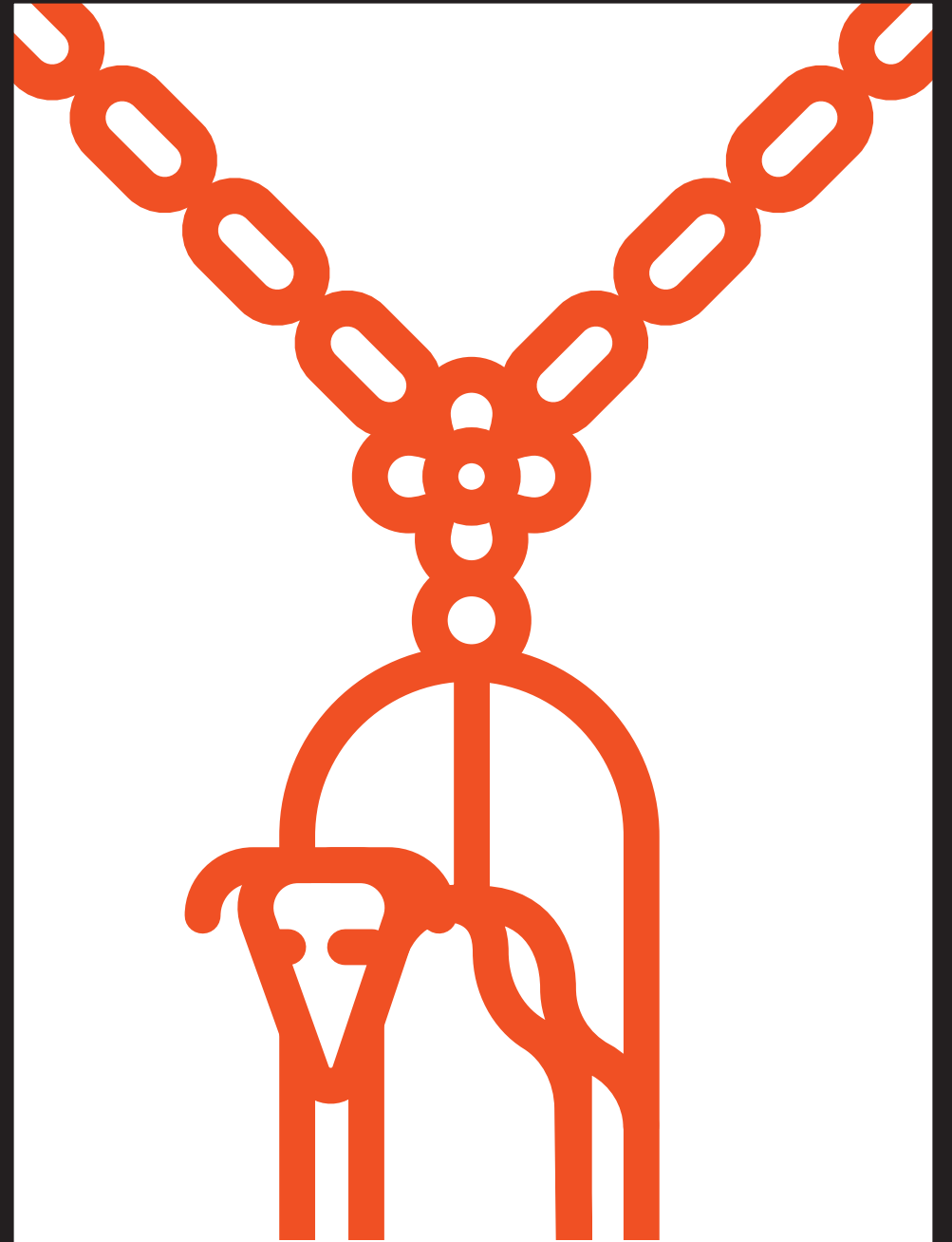

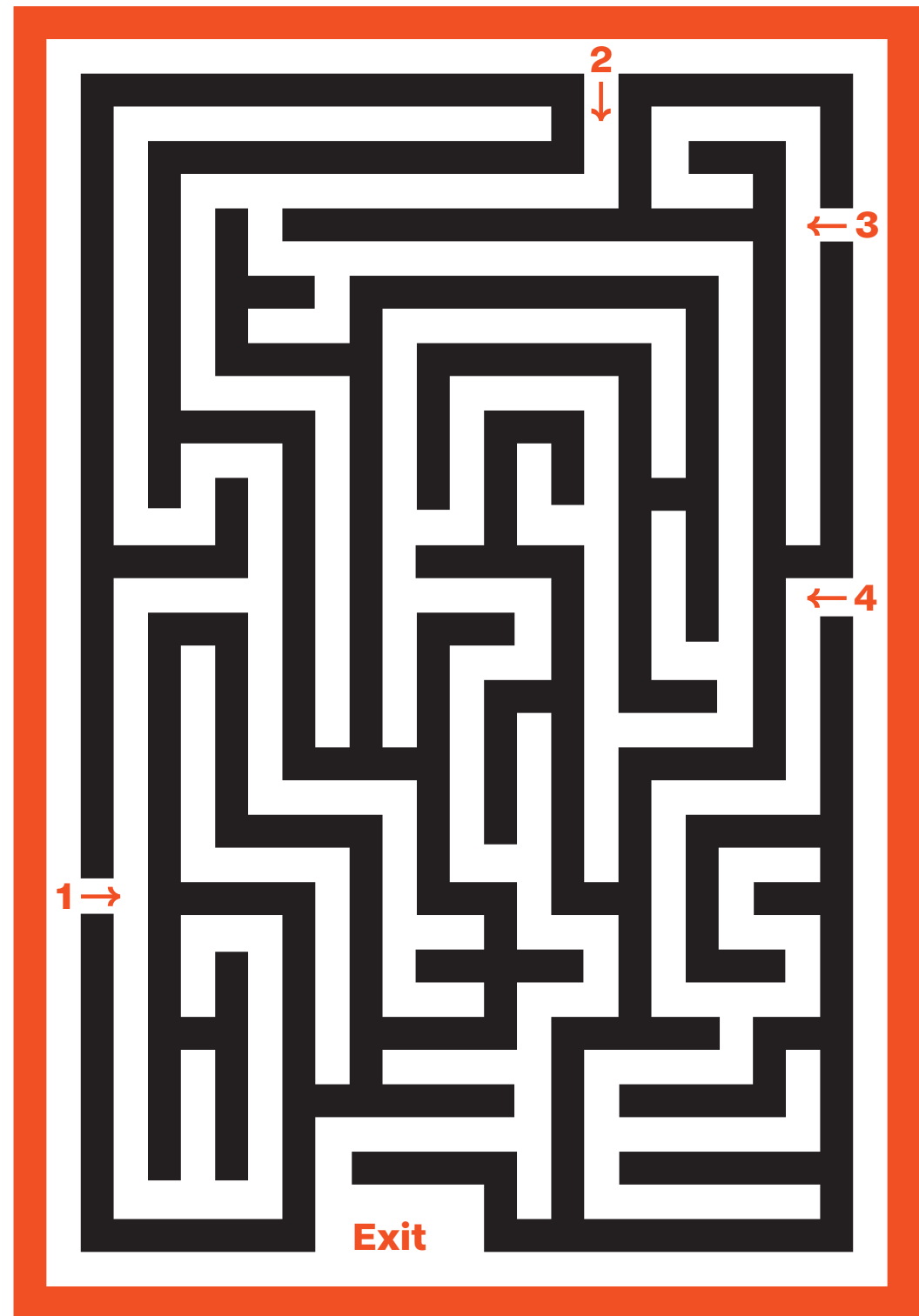
The underground galleries of the fort are a real labyrinth!
